MK IRISH MATCH RE

Real Bedford exits the FA Cup after losing 4-3 against MK Irish.

Goals from Joey Evans and a brace from Ben Stevens were not enough to beat MK Irish as the visitors scored four goals to knock The Pirates out of England's most prestigious competition.

Real Bedford started the game on the back foot, and 10 minutes in, MK Irish got their first goal. A miss pass from Tom Woods at the back gave MK Irish possession in a good position. Andre Olukanmi then made space out wide to cross the ball into George Shrieves, who tapped it home for the Irish to give them an early lead.

However, Bedford looked to respond quickly, with Lewis Burgess' long throw-ins seeming to cause problems for the MK Irish defence. Still, the best chance came after a delivery from Burgess slipped through the hands of goalkeeper Kyeremateng forcing MK Irish captain Ty Ward to clear the ball off the line.

With Bedford looking to respond, MK Irish doubled down on the halfway mark. George Hirst swiped the ball from Charlie Smith in the midfield, and as Real Bedford players awaited the whistle for a foul, Irish

pounced, Mason Spence getting his first goal with a well-timed finish on the turn to double their away team's lead.

This time, Bedford did manage to capitalise immediately. A teasing pass upfield from Charlie Smith found Joey Evans, who raced Kyeremateng for the ball, but the keeper brought down The Pirates striker as he looked to round him. The challenge left the referee pointing to the spot, giving Evans a chance to half the deficit, which he managed to do with a well-taken penalty to get The Pirates off the mark.

Real then brought the game level just before the halftime whistle. Intricate play in the midfield unlocked the Irish defence giving Ben Stevens a chance to smash the ball into the back of the net and cancel out MK Irish's lead inside 5 minutes.

The home side could have gone into the break ahead. Ben Stevens found himself able to race into the box from the wing, but his shot hit the post.

Second Half

The visitors similarly started the second half to the first. More good work from George Shrieves down the wing threatened the



Bedford goal, and his first run of the second half was defended well. Still, the ball ended up at the feet of Ryan Smith, who put in a well-timed cross for Mason Spence, who headed the ball into the back of the net for his second of the afternoon and MK Irish's third.

Five minutes later, and Irish were threatening again. The Pirates failed to clear a corner, which gave Ryan Smith a free shot at goal, increasing the goal difference back to 2 with 30 minutes left on the clock.

Bedford pushed to come back again, with chances going begging for Ben Stevens and Joey Evans, as well as a reasonable effort from Jordan Brown, who smashed the ball into the side netting at the near post.

The Pirates reduced the deficit to one goal with 10 minutes to go. The goal came through after some more good interplay within the Bedford midfield, where a deflected shot from Evans fell to Ben Stevens once again, who found the back of the net for the second time with a curling shot past the keeper and off the inside of the post, to give Real a fighting chance in the dying stages of the game.


Knowing that a draw would take The Pirates

to a replay on Tuesday, Bedford pushed hard for their fourth goal. Once again causing issues in the box, Joey Evans gained the ball from a well-worked set-piece, accelerating towards goal; the striker was brought down by Kyeremateng once more, forcing the referee to point to the spot for the second time this afternoon. However, as Evans stepped up this time, he couldn't find the back of the net. A good save from Kyeremateng pushed the ball out for a corner that Bedford could not capitalise on, giving MK Irish the win in a dramatic final few minutes.

Bedford returns to McMullen Park next weekend as they face Rothwell Corinthians in the first round of the FA Vase. Tickets are now available on the club website.

Hello, and a warm welcome to everyone joining us today at McMullen Park for our first FA Vase match against Rothwell Corinthians. The Vase represents another chance for The Pirates to reach Wembley following our exit from the FA Cup after a narrow 4-3 defeat to MK Irish.

I want to congratulate the Lionesses on their success in the World Cup. Despite losing in the final, it has been an incredible run for the team - two finals in two years and coming close to being both Euro and World Champions. Tournament football is hard, and the Lionesses have done the country proud. With the final played on Sunday, our ladies' game against Dunstable was postponed to this past Thursday to allow the teams to watch the game. I am proud to say that the ladies travelled to Dunstable and came away with a massive 7-0 win. I am very confident about our chances of challenging for the title this season, and they now have two outstanding wins under their belts.

Before today's match, we hosted our first Bitcoin meetup of the season. It might sound unusual for a football club to host such events, but at Real Bedford, we believe in the transformative potential of Bitcoin, not just for our club but for society at large. Historically, football teams established themselves in their communities, representing the local people. Our club formed as a works team of the printing firm Diemer & Reynolds, and before being called Real Bedford, as Bedford United, they were known as The Printers. For us, it is important that a team stands for something, and we stand for protecting the financial interests of

I have worked in the Bitcoin industry for six years

and first bought Bitcoin in 2013. One common problem I run into is how misunderstood it is. It's shrouded in technical jargon and misrepresented in the media. But, to merely pigeonhole it would be doing a disservice to its profound implications.

Bitcoin, as a monetary technology, is revolutionary. As a decentralised money, it is censorship-resistant, meaning no single entity can control or dictate its operations, and no third party can interfere with a transaction. Couple this with the 21 million hard cap - ensuring only a finite amount of Bitcoin will ever exist, preventing arbitrary minting. Bitcoin has become a viable alternative to the traditional monetary system, plagued with corruption, debt and inflation.

We live in uncertain economic times. Globally, we're witnessing ballooning government debts, soaring interest rates, and troublingly high inflation rates. The UK is no stranger to these phenomena. One needs to merely look at our government's debt levels and ask the unsettling question, "Why are they so high?"

During my recent visit to Argentina, I had the opportunity to make a documentary and witness firsthand the devastating impacts of very high inflation, which currently hovers around 150%. Such high inflation corrodes the very fabric of society, eroding individuals' ability to store their hard-earned money and plan for the future. It is not just numbers on a board; it's families struggling to make ends meet, businesses collapsing, and a brain drain as many young people leave the country to seek a future that isn't stolen from them. Argentina used to be one of the most



wealthy countries in South America, but decades of government economic mismanagement have destroyed its wealth. Please do not think a similar situation can't come to our country. Just look at our debt to GDP levels, the rising cost of living and the pressure on the government to continue printing money for votes.

I'm not some conspiracy theorist donning a tin foil hat. The evidence of this is public. One example is government expenditure, available for us all to see on the Office for Budget Responsibility website. The 23/24 budget notes that government expenditure will be £1,189bn while receipts are just £1,058bn, a deficit of £132bn. If you look closer, you will notice the scandalous position the government has put this country in, where they spend £94bn on debt interest alone, compared to the education budget of £81.4bn. How are we in a place where the government is spending more on debt interest than education? Now ask yourself, do you think we are getting value for money? Are you happy watching your wealth eroded in the place between taxation and inflation?

You may think Bitcoin is nonsense and have little interest in it, but I urge you to look at why inflation is happening and how it punishes you by eroding your savings. I encourage everyone to take a moment, observe the current economic landscape, and ask vital questions.

Back to Bitcoin. Its core philosophy offers a powerful counter-narrative to the economic turbulence we witness. Bitcoin is politically neutral. Like gold, it serves as a store of value without the constant risk of debasement. It promises a

future where the separation of money and state becomes a reality, a world where centralised authorities, prone to inefficiencies and corruption, no longer hold the sole reins of our monetary systems.

That said, I am not here to preach or push anyone towards investing in Bitcoin. Its emergent nature brings with it high price volatility and security considerations. But I urge everyone to at least educate themselves about this groundbreaking technology and why it has grown in popularity so much since the 2008 financial crisis.

If you have questions about the economy, government policy or Bitcoin and want to learn more, please join one of our meetups. You may also wish to check out my podcast, What Bitcoin Did, where I discuss all these topics and more with experts across Bitcoin and macroeconomics. Lastly, I made a documentary series called Follow the Money, where I look at these topics, all available on my YouTube channel.

As we gear up for today's clash, I'd like to take a moment to thank everyone who keeps coming down to our matches. Your support is the lifeblood of this club. Let's rally behind our team today as they look to progress to the next round of The Vase.

This week, we sat down with Real Bedford defender Lewis Burgess. After joining the Pirates midway through their cup and league-winning campaign, Burgess has cemented himself as a crucial cog within the Real Bedford backline. In this interview, Lewis talks about the start of the season, as well as his life off the field.

It has been a mixed week of results. What did you take away from both FA Cup games over the last fortnight?

I've watched them back, and I think, on the whole, we played a lot of good football. We are translating what we are working hard on in training into games, which is positive for how we want to play. Despite not getting the result against MK Irish last weekend, we are definitely improving week on week and game on game.

One cup run ends as another begins. What are the ambitions for the team within this FA Vase campaign?

Newport Pagnell Town has given everyone a good blueprint for success within this competition; getting to the final two times in a row is a great achievement. I

actually went to Wembley to watch this year, and the standard of football is certainly something we can match. It's a far more realistic competition to go deeper in than the FA Cup, and there seems to be a real buzz around McMullen Park about what we can do this season.

There's been a lot of chopping and changing in the backline, with a fair few injuries to the defensive ranks. Is it tricky to get that team chemistry with players rotating?

I actually think it helps us. Sure, there's been a lot of change, but it's shown the strength and depth of our squad and allowed for a lot of players to get game time in different combinations early on in the season, which will certainly help us in the long run. And as players like Ben Walsh and Joe Steele return from more long-term injuries, it creates some real competition for shirts on match day, which I love.

Your long throw-ins catch the eye of many supporters. When did you add that skill to your locker?

It's a funny story, really. I remember play-

ing U7 football in the local park and thinking, “I can throw this ball the length of the pitch.” It’s certainly down to genetics in part, but also probably my gymnastic and trampolining background, which gives me flexibility in my arms and strength in my calves to power myself forward. But yeah, sometimes I’m surprised at how far I can throw it!

Not many footballers can boast such a high level of competitive gymnastics. What was it like growing up involved in two relatively contrasting sports?

It was really tricky at school. Especially during my teenage years, I ultimately quit trampolining despite being at a really good level just because, at 15/16 years old, I was embarrassed to be wearing a leotard and would rather put on some shin pads and go play football like the other boys. That’s something I regret slightly now, as I gave it up for the wrong reasons.

Ultimately, what led you down the path of becoming a semi-pro footballer?

Despite being slightly forced down the

path of football originally to almost conform to the social norms, University made me truly fall in love with the game. I went to the University of Bedfordshire, and I joined as quite a quiet kid. But when playing football, I really started to come out of my shell and become more vocal. I then actually got asked to play for England Universities for two years, which was a real honour, as well as becoming president of football at Bedford University. It was what encouraged me to take up football semi-pro and go into PE teaching.

What are you expecting from our visitors, Rothwell Corinthians, today?

I used to play for them and even captained them early in my career while I was still at Uni. They are a route one side who do the basics well, so we can’t afford to be too complacent. They have some star players, too, who will look to cause us problems, but hopefully, with the home advantage, we can come out on top and progress through the Vase.

Fun fact: I don't actually have a sense of smell. But from the amount of knock-off LV Knighty has in his bag, I'd assume it's him.


Who is your best mate in the squad?

As one cup campaign comes to an end, another one begins with the introduction of the FA Vase to McMullen Park. We are incredibly excited about this competition,



Welcome everyone to today's game at McMullen Park. I hope today's game is enjoyable, high-quality and, from my point of view, injury-free.

There has been a lot of work behind the scenes at the start of this season within the physiotherapy department at Real Bedford. I want to thank Pete, Emma, Rob and everyone else at the club who has facilitated this refurbishment. We have some new rehab equipment for Real Bedford players, including a new exercise bike, foam rollers, padded blocks, and free weights to aid the players on their road to recovery, no matter how long.

Despite this, it has been a fairly busy start to the season for me. One injury fans may not yet be aware of is Tom Hitchcock's fractured wrist, which he sustained during the FA Cup replay against FC Clacton. The injury will, unfortunately, sideline Tom for the next six weeks. However, Tom has already begun working on his fitness on the bike and in light running sessions so that when his wrist has fully healed, he can make an instant and impactful return.

In more positive news, many players have been working hard to recover from more long-term injuries, making significant progress throughout pre-season and into the start of this campaign. The most notable is

Ben Walsh, who injured his ACL just over a year ago during the 2022/23 Real Bedford pre-season campaign. Eight months after his surgery and after a lot of hard work in rehab, I'm delighted to have cleared him to return to training this week. It's usually challenging for players to recover from such major injuries as an ACL tear, but Ben has put in so much effort over the last year, and I'm excited to see him back in a Real Bedford shirt very soon.

Joe Steele was another victim of a nasty ACL injury two years ago, which prevented him from playing last season. He has been working hard to strengthen the knee further and has returned to team training this week.

My highlight from the clinic room this year so far, though, has to be the work done by Joey Evans. Joey sustained a quadriceps muscle strain during pre-season. But after a positive meeting, a good amount of rest and rehab, he took part in the first league match of the campaign, bagging the winning goal vs MK Irish.

THE AWAY TEAM

Rothwell Corinthians began playing competitive football in 1934 when they joined the Kettering and District Amateur League. The idea of the team was first put forward in a terrace house on Littlewood Street. At that time, the league had three divisions, and the Corinthians were placed in the Second Division. When football resumed after the Second World War, the Corinthians played at the old recreation ground. This venue was their headquarters for the majority of the next twenty years. The Corinthians introduced their first reserve team into the league in 1950 and, nine years later, they brought the first senior league honors to the club when they became Champions of Division Three.

The following season, the first team won the First Division Championship, and they repeated this feat in 1964. However, the next season they were relegated, and by the end of the decade, they found themselves in the

Third Division. It was not until 1979 that they began to get noticed again as they were promoted to the First Division and also managed to reach the N.F.A. Area Cup Final. The 1980-81 season marked the beginning of the club's emergence as we know it today. With the move to Rothwell Town's Cricket Ground came a more professional approach to the organization of the club. Coinciding with this, the League had restyled itself as the East Midlands Alliance and raised its standards, a move much appreciated by the Corinthians.

In 1984, the Corinthians gained promotion to the Premier Division. Meanwhile, behind the scenes, the club had purchased the land on which the present facilities are located. These facilities were officially opened by Northampton Town in 1986. The 1989-90 season saw the Corinthians lift their first Premier Division Championship. The 1994-95 season saw them secure their second Premier Championship,



and after consultation with the United Counties League Management Committee, promotion was secured.

Recent seasons have seen three appearances in the Northamptonshire Junior Cup Final, with a win registered in 2008. Promotion to the United Counties Premier Division was achieved the same season under the management of Frank Ielapi, assisted by Paul Smith. With Ielapi and Smith standing down after one season at the higher level, Corinthians changed managers each of the following two seasons but struggled during their time at level 5. They still managed, however, to win the Youth League Cup and Reserve Supplementary Cup in 2009/10, but the First team dropped back down into UCL Div1.

Shaun Sparrow joined as manager, rejuvenating the club with promotion back to the Premier Division in 2015, and more recently, with Jim Scott as joint manager, saw three mid-table

finishes. The Reserves have also had recent success with two UCL knockout Cup Finals in 2016 and 2017, winning the first, and were losing finalists in the NFA lower Junior Cup in 2014. Our under 18's were losing finalists in the 2018 NSYFL league cup final.

Mitch Austin took the reins for the 2019/20 season and led the team to the 1st Qualifying round of the FA Cup and the UCL Knockout Cup Final before its curtailment. Upon the league's resumption after the COVID-19 lockdown and under the stewardship of Wayne Abbott, the club finally played the delayed UCL knockout League Cup final and claimed the trophy for the first time in the club's history with a 1-0 win over Holbeach United in November 2020.

For the 23/24 season, we drop to step 6 and the Spartan South Midlands League Division One after our relegation from the United Counties League.


