Real Bedford continued their fine form on the road with a hard-fought 4-1 victory at Aylesbury Vale Dynamos.

Under the Tuesday night lights, The Pirates won again to remain unbeaten in the league with a victory over a tricky Aylesbury Vale Dynamos.

Real Bedford started the game with a big scare, as a back pass from Eddie Corbit to Tyler McGregor wasn't dealt with by either Real Bedford player. Despite making an admirable save, McGregor could not defend a lobed follow-up effort from Sam Olawale, which found its way into the back of the net, only for the linesman to raise his flag, ruling out the goal for offside.

A few minutes later, the home team were causing more trouble for The Pirates. Abu Kahn dispossessed Ben Stevens, and the midfielder set up Lewis Workman for a one-on-one. However, the Aylesbury striker failed to get his shot on target. Real Bedford looked to take control of the game after that and, at the 30-minute mark, got the breakthrough they were looking for. A well-timed through ball from Charlie Smith found Archie Jones in the box before he was brought down by Aylesbury's Antonio Ianelli, leaving the referee to point to the spot. Luke Knight stepped up and slotted it past the keeper to get Bedford off the mark and give the captain his second goal from 12 yards in as many games.

Ten minutes later and after continued possession from Bedford, they found themselves in on goal. Once again playing provider, Charlie Smith beamed a pass upfield to Ben Stevens, who applied a delicate touch to put through Archie Jones. Despite being under considerable pressure from the Aylesbury defence, Jones got enough of a touch to poke the ball past the keeper and into the back of the net to double Real Bedford's lead.

tack sparked by Fabian Garcia allowed Abu Khan to play a looped cross towards the back post. With most Real Bedford players tracking back from the previous corner, an unmarked Jake Baldwin found space and could nudge it home, bringing the home side back into the game at the halftime oranges.

Second Half

The Pirates continued their composure on the ball in the second half, looking to protect their lead, and soon restored their two-goal cushion after the break. Lee Watkins found Josh Setchell in space out wide, and the winger accelerated forward into the box before being brought down by Dino Bonwick, giving the referee little option but to call for another penalty. Luke Knight once again dispatched the spot kick similarly to extend Bedford's lead again.

To make matters worse for the home side, Aylesbury had a player sent to the sin bin just before the penalty, leaving them a man down for 10 minutes. Bedford took advantage of the extra man. Firstly, a long-range shot from Archie Jones fired just wide preceded a teasing effort from Josh Setchell, which rattled off the crossbar.

The final goal did eventually arrive. Good counterattacking play from Real gave Charlie Smith the ball in the midfield, who delivered the ball to Joey Evans, who held up play and put Mo Ahmed through with a tempting pass. The substitute used his speed to get to the ball ahead of the keeper before chipping it over Charlie Jones and into the back of the net providing Rob Sinclair's men with the perfect conclusion to a testing game.

I'm writing from Beirut, where I am making a documentary about Lebanon's economic crisis.

My job takes me off the beaten track, and on these travels, I've observed the destructive power of weak institutions, high inflation and pervasive corruption - and the pattern is always the same.

High inflation, often underestimated in Western countries, disrupts public services and erodes infrastructure. For Lebanon, this was tragically evident on August 4th 2020, when an explosion ripped through the city following the negligent storage of 2,750 tonnes of ammonium nitrate, devastating Beirut's port and resulting in the loss of over 200 lives.

Many explanations exist for why Lebanon is in crisis, often blaming other outside influences or religious tensions. Still, whoever is to blame, the outcome is the same when a country's leadership prioritises personal gain over public welfare.

A consequence of this failure in governance is the nation's energy predicament, where extended blackouts are the norm and only a couple of hours of power come from the grid each day.

Reliable access to energy and a stable monetary system is fundamental for societal growth and stability, and without them, economic development stagnates or declines. However, despite this adversity, the people of Lebanon are resilient:

Their response to a failing national currency was to transition to using dollars. Their response to extended blackouts was to build local energy sovereignty, where mini-local grids have arrived, optimising for a mix of grid, solar and generator energy.

Not only have I witnessed the ingenuity of the individual, but I have met those looking to scale solutions. Organisations such as Rebirth Beirut are at the

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forefront of these efforts. They are working diligently on projects to restart street and traffic lights, benefiting local communities and businesses.

We in the West take for granted a stable energy grid. Driving through a dark Beirut and witnessing my driver navigate a busy crossroads without traffic lights reminded me that we should take nothing for granted.

Observing Lebanon's situation reminds me of a broader perspective: no country is exempt from such challenges. I've seen economic stressors in numerous places globally and can recognise the signals within the UK that we may face our own challenges, and I worry about how much worse it can get.

We, too, face many issues: substantial governmental debt, increasing financial obligations, and a propensity towards taxation and money printing. Coupled with rising interest rates and recessionary pressures, it is clear that we face some difficult choices ahead as the financial burdens on the government grow into a weakening economy. We need a more balanced approach with efficient government, a focus on free markets, reduced taxation, and sustainable fiscal planning. We build strength outside of government, not because of them.

Turning to football, I want to congratulate my manager, Rob Sinclair, for winning every game during my absence and our ladies' manager, Dean Perrett, for their recent success at Wroxham, maintaining their 100% record. As I travel for work, I know the club is in good hands.

Let's hope we get another three points this afternoon.
