



Real Bedford Lose Unbeaten League Record at Home to St. Panteleimon.

The Pirates experienced their first league defeat of the season on Saturday, falling 4-1 at home to St. Panteleim2on. An own goal from the visitors wasn't enough to keep Bedford in the fight, as two late goals punished Rob Sinclair's men in a cagey affair.

St. Panteleimon only took 8 minutes to get on the score sheet. Courtney Massey intercepted a loose pass at the back from Luke Knight and took his time to line up a powerful shot, beating Tyler McGregor to fire the away side into an early lead.

Four minutes later, the Pirates were back on level terms. Goalkeeper Tyler McGregor quickly launched a counterattack following a St. Panteleimon corner, and after some well worked hold up play from Mo Ahmed, the ball was sprayed out wide to Ben Stevens. The winger delivered a cross, which was met by the head of the Saints defender Renzo Alves, misdirecting the keeper as the ball flew into the back of the St. Panteleimon net.

St. Panteleimon didn't take long to restore their lead. A direct run into the area from Flavio Gyanu resulted in a shot parried by Tyler McGregor only as far as Javarn Bernard, who was then taken down in the area by Luke Knight, resulting in the referee pointing to the spot. Courtney Massey dispatched the spot kick despite McGregor's best efforts, putting the away side back into the lead before the break.

Bedford seemed to start the second half with fighting spirit, leading to their first chance of the half just four minutes after the restart. A



strong run from James Ducket down the flank put Mo Ahmed in space, who crossed to Archie Jones, who hit the target but not with enough force to test Lincoln Marques in the St. Panteleimon goal.

Bedford were soon in again, this time off a set piece. A quick corner from Lee Watkins left Ben Stevens with time to pick out a cross toward the Saints box, finding Lewis Burgess, whose header struck the crossbar, leaving Real Bedford fans with their heads in their hands. The chances kept coming for The Pirates, and moments later, James Ducket's header was inches away from finding the target off of another well-worked Bedford move.

However, St. Panteleimon absorbed the threats well and were clinical in attack, and a swift counterattacking play saw Hamza Miezou and Flavio Gyawu link up, with the latter smashing the ball past McGregor at the second time of asking to double the visitor's lead.

The final goal was to come late on in the game, as Real Bedford desperately pushed for a goal to drag themselves back into the game. On another counter, Joao Praes took a gamble at the other end of the pitch, hitting a long-range shot from outside the area, which flew past McGregor for a spectacular fourth Saints goal.

This week, we sat down with Ben Stevens. Having impressed in his first few months at McMullen Park, Stevens talks about his successes on and off the field in football-maintaining a business, coaching the next generation and how it affects his time on the pitch.

It was a tough game last weekend. What has been the main takeaway from the loss to St. Panteleimon?

It was a tough game and certainly an eye-opener for what we can expect in this league. We know it's not all going to be smooth sailing, and with the sheer number of games we will play this season, we can't expect to win them all, but now it is about how we bounce back and improve this weekend.

You joined The Pirates in the summer. How have you found your time at Mc-Mullen Park so far?

I have loved it. It is such a professional environment. The coaches are incredible and always push us to new and better levels. The playing squad are also quality both on and off the pitch. It has just been a great experience so far overall.

Away from your time at McMullen Park, you're involvement with football doesn't stop. How did you come about running a Futsal company?

Well, it was initially a bit of a Plan B. During my time at Luton Town, I decided to get into a bit of coaching on the side at Mid Beds Futsal, and when my time at Luton came to a close, I was enjoying my coaching so much that I decided to continue with it full time. The opportunity arose for me to buy into the business, and after a fair amount of consideration, I decided to jump at the opportunity and have loved it ever since.

At still a young age in your footballing career, what made you want to pursue this entrepreneurial opportunity?

It wasn't an easy decision, for sure. I knew that buying into the business would mean a lot more work. But I was really enjoying my coaching, and to be honest, last year when I made my decision, my football had stalled a little bit, so it just came at the right time for me.



What's been your biggest learning curve in managing a business alongside football? Do they compliment each other?

It has certainly been a big jump from just coaching at Mid Beds Futsal. We run weekly sessions with kids and summer camps in the holidays, so the admin, advertising and everything in between is pretty much non-stop. I'd say, therefore, the biggest learning I have taken from it is certainly my time management and communication skills. Days are usually pretty full-on, so it's important that I get stuff done at the right time, which pushes me to work even harder and improve the business as a whole. That being said, it is hard work, but I wouldn't want to do anything else. I feel super lucky that my job means I get to be outside and active all the time. That's certainly a way it compliments my on-field play.

How much do you take from the coaching and culture at the club when teaching the next generation of players at Mid Beds Futsal?

I have learnt so much from all the Real

Bedford coaches. The positivity instilled by Rob in training sessions, games and beyond fills me with confidence and facilitates me to play at the top of my game. That positive mindset and encouragement to express yourself on the pitch is something I try to translate into my coaching, especially with the younger kids.

What are you expecting from our visitors, Flackwell Heath, today?

It'll be another challenge for us at home. They are a fairly unknown entity, being a part of a different league, but we know their strengths within their squad, and they have started the season very well. The prospect of the FA Vase is also something that will inspire the squad today. It's no secret that this competition leads to a game at Wembley, but it'll be down to us to take it a game at a time and give it all to beat what will be a very strong Flackwell Heath outfit.



This week, I was honoured to attend a two-day course with Women in Football Leadership at Brentford FC. The second part of the course will take place in Manchester in early November, and I look forward to meeting another group of powerful ladies. I have also received an invite to attend a WIF event at Wembley Stadium in 2 weeks. I feel welcomed and part of something extremely influential within women's football. I want to thank



Peter for encouraging me to attend these events and everyone at the club who - they are my biggest supporters. The environment created at McMullen Park allows for such development and progress for staff like myself.

Women In football is an incredible organisation of professionals working in and around the football industry who support and champion their peers. It is inspiring that groups like Women In Football are not only set up but now thrive with partners such as Barclays and The FA in full support of their goals and recognise the work that needs to be done within the women's game on and off the field.



Flackwell Heath F.C. was established in 1907 and joined the High Wycombe and District Leagué. They went on to win the league twelve times, as well as winning the High Wycombe Senior Challenge Cup twelve times. In 1950 the club moved up to Division Two of the Great Western Combination, which they won at the first attempt to earn promotion to Division One. This was renamed the Premier Division in 1954, and the club were runners-up in 1956-57 before winning the league in 1957-58. They were champions again in 1962-63. However, the league folded at the end of the 1963-64 season.

resulting in the club returning to the High Wycombe and District League.

In 1974–75 Flackwell Heath won both the Reading Senior Cup and the Berks & Bucks Intermediate Cup. In 1976 they moved up to Division One of the Hellenic League and were runners-up in their first season in the division, earning promotion to the Premier Division. In 1982 they switched to the Athenian League, but it folded at the end of the 1983–84 season, with the club joining Division Two North of the Isthmian League instead. At the end of the 1984–85 season they were



transferred to Division Two South, where they remained until league restructuring saw them placed in Division Three in 1991. The division was renamed Division Two in 2002, and when it was abolished in 2006, the club were initially due to be transferred to the Spartan South Midlands League, but East Ham United folding led to the club being restored to the Isthmian League and placed in Division One North.

The 2006–07 season saw Flackwell Heath finish bottom of Division One North, resulting in relegation to the Premier Division of the Hellenic League. They won the league in 2014–15 and were set to be promoted to Division One Central of the Southern League. However, after Clevedon Town were demoted, they were provisionally placed in Division One South & West and subsequently declined promotion due to increased travelling costs. In 2015-16 the club won the Berks & Bucks Senior Trophy, beating Newport Pagnell Town 2–0 in the final. At the end of the 2020-21 season they were transferred to the Premier Division of the Spartan South Midlands League.
