

Real Bedford progressed through to the second round of the FA Vase after a stunning performance against MK Irish away from home.

Having already competed against Irish twice this season, with the victories shared between the sides. The Pirates knew that they would need to produce an impressive performance to overcome the home side over the 90 minutes.

Despite starting as a relatively even competition, with both sides creating chances inside the first 20 minutes, a fluke moment allowed Real Bedford to take an early lead. Lewis Burgess' long throw-in from the lefthand side of the pitch soared into the area and towards Tom Ladyman in goal. The keeper punched the ball in an effort to clear the danger but mistimed his effort, and the ball instead ended up nestling in the top corner without any further touches

from Bedford players.

Soon after. Real Bedford doubled their lead with a more technical move. Mo Ahmed, Josh Setchell and Ben Stevens all got moments on the ball in the final third off the back of a Pirates corner before Stevens hit a perfect strike past Ladyman to make it 2-0 to the visitors inside the 30-minute mark.

From a similar position to the first goal, another Lewis Burgess throwin seemed to cause more issues for Irish, as the defender launched another ball into the area. The head of Ollie Swain met the throw, but the centre-back couldn't find the taraet. and Bedford headed into the break with a healthy 2-goal lead.

Second Half

It was more of the same from the away side in the second half, as



Bedford continued to dominate possession and not allow MK Irish to get any chances towards goal. Ten minutes into the half, Lee Watkins linked up well with Ben Stevens on the right flank. The midfielder crossed the ball back into Joey Evans, whose shot was parried away by Ladyman but only as far as Ahmed, who tapped it in at the back post to further Real's advantage.

And it didn't take long for Ahmed to be in again. Just over 5 minutes later, Joey Evans headed on a clearance kick from Lewis Burgess into Ahmed's path, who raced clear of the defenders and chipped Ladyman to bag his brace, pushing Bedford 4 goals clear with 30 minutes left to play.

Despite being home and dry, The Pirates pushed for more. Ahmed was denied his hat-trick as a shot on a tight angle was inches away from hitting the top corner. Joey Evans was later denied from point-blank range as Ladyman smothered his shot on the turn from 2 metres out. Josh Setchell came close, cutting in from the left and curling a shot around the post in an audacious, low-driven effort.

But the final goal did soon come. Mo Ahmed was once again involved, Pickpocketing Clinton Zawe of possession before driving into the box and laying it off to Evans, who smashed it into a vacant net to further his impressive goal tally within the FA Vase competition.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

Welcome back to McMullen Park, you crazy Pirates. Today, we face Arlesey Town, which we know will be a challenging match following the hard game they gave us away earlier in the season.

Running a football club is no small feat, and the challenges are as numerous as they are varied. The complexity of organising and managing all the cogs that make this club work should not be underestimated, and it involves the hard work and dedication of an extensive team of professionals and volunteers.

Compared to the traditional businesses I have managed, Real Bedford FC is unique. The unpredictability of the game, the passion of the fans, and the intense schedule of matches and training sessions create a dynamic and challenging environment, but one I love.

Abandoning a game brings many challenges, including the logistics of rescheduling amidst an already packed calendar, the burden on players travelling long distances midweek, and the financial implications of paying players for an additional game, refunding fans and paying officials.

Managing a football pitch is a science in itself, requiring meticulous attention from off-season renovations to ongoing weather management and post-match repairs.

Preparing for a match day is a huge task, one that we spend all week on when we are playing at home, and we could not accomplish it without the dedication of our team and a host of invaluable volunteers. From stocking the bar and preparing food to managing the gate and handling our social media presence, every little detail matters and everyone who is part of this carries out their tasks with precision and care.

Post-match duties are just as crucial, from feeding both teams to updating official systems and preparing for the next match, and then beyond match days, we must ensure facilities are available for training, engage with community groups, manage our e-commerce, and much more.

Our volunteers, especially those involved with the junior teams of Real Bedford Ladies and Bedford Park Rangers, play a vital role in nurturing junior



sports, providing quality coaching and ensuring a fun environment for all. They do all this in their spare time for the love of the game and to give kids in Bedford the opportunity to play football and develop.

Success in football requires a relentless dedication to excellence, but the unique thing about football is, however hard you have prepared, it all comes down to those 90 minutes, where we rely on the team to win three points or get us through to the next round of the cup. You can do everything right, and sometimes things don't go your way; perhaps a shot is missed, a referee's decision goes against you, or floodlights fail when you are 2-0 up. It is this unpredictability which makes football so addictive. With traditional business, you have forecasts and history to rely on. With football, you have no idea what will happen when Saturday comes.

c. Emma Firman, my Chief Executive, the heartbeat of our operations.

d. Neil McCormack, my secretary, for his excellent work on our infrastructure strategy.

e. Kitman Gezza, for his exceptional work with our kits and ensuring the teams have everything they need on a match day. As I write this, he is standing in front of me, preparing all the kits for the matches we have this weekend.

f. Will Roberts, for driving our social media engagement to new heights.

g. Benji, our new commentator, for making our live streams and audio broadcasts exciting for the fans who can't be with us at McMullen Park.

h. Seren, for her invaluable support during ladies' match days, the No.1 Roberts in sports.

Real Bedford fell short in the first round of the Beds Senior Challenge Trophy with a 3-1 loss to Leighton Town on the road.

With a heavily rotated side from the weekend, The Pirates conceded two late goals and exited the competition at the hands of the Step 4 side despite having the majority of possession throughout the 90 minutes.

The best chances of the first half fell to Real Bedford. A good ball from Claston Gordon on the right flank found the head of Tom Hitchcock, but Karl Daley tipped his header around the post to deny The Pirates the opening score. Bedford were nearly off the mark off the resulting corner, Ollie Swain rising highest off the set piece, but Daley just managed to tip his header over the bar.

Real Bedford also had a solid red card shout in the first half. A long ball over the top of the defence found Joey Evans, who looked to tap it past Karl Daley, who had sprinted out to meet the striker. The collision between the two players saw Evans hit the deck; however, the referee only brandished Daley with a yellow card despite being the last man, as Evans appeared to have pushed the ball out wide.

Second Half

The game lit up in the second period, with all the goals coming with 20 minutes to go. Leighton got the opener off a corner, with the ball

From very young, I was surrounded by football. I remember during the school holidays I would go with my dad to training at Chelsea and be amongst it all. For any 7 or 8-year-old, it would be a dream, but for me, it was normal. When I got older and started playing, he would be quite tough on me. Only because he knew I had talent and he wanted to help me succeed. Looking back, I wouldn't have wanted it any other way. When I joined Blackburn, initially, I was known as "Hitchy's son", but that soon wore off as I proved my worth. Having my dad in the game had its pros and cons for sure, but he is such an inspiration to me. As I said, I certainly wouldn't change it.

As a father yourself now, is there a chance your kids may follow the





Real Bedford put four past Crawley Green to close the gap at the top of the league.

Goals from Evans and Swain, a brace from Ben Stevens and a Crawley Green consolation effort left the score at 4-1 on a cold Saturday afternoon.

The Pirates got off to a fast start and found their first chance inside 5 minutes. A short corner routine between Ahmed and Stevens saw the latter whip in an inviting cross towards the head of Lewis Burgess, who flicked it across the face of the goal in agonising fashion.

Bedford continued to knock on the Crawley door but struggled to find clear opportunities to break the deadlock as the Crawley defence held firm. Pirates fans would have to wait until just before the halftime break before the first goal of the game. Crawley's goalkeeper parried a shot from range from Ben Stevens, but only as far as Joey Evans. The striker reset the play, finding Lewis Burgess in a deeper role, before finding Stevens inside the area. Stevens evaded defenders well before firing a shot towards goal, taking a deflection to fool Tierney Parker in between the sticks and cross the whitewash for the first goal of the game.

Second Half

Real Bedford continued their intensity from the end of the first half into the start of the second and found more opportunities as Crawley came out less defensive. 10 minutes in, a Charlie Smith corner was punched away by Parker to Setchell, who fizzed it back towards goal on the half volley from 20 yards out. Parker again parried the effort, and Ollie Swain picked up the scraps from out wide, delivering a ball to the back post towards his centre-back partner Luke Knight. However, the captain's header was off-target, and Crawley got away without conceding.

Real Bedford did get their second a few minutes later. Charlie Smith regained possession in the midfield before playing a direct pass towards Evans, who raced towards goal. With Stevens, Corbit and

Ahmed all in pursuit. Evans took his time before laying it off to Stevens, who in turn found Corbit, then Ahmed before playing it back to Evans a few yards out, who made no mistake, bagging his 20th goal of the season inside 20 games.

Bedford got their third after the 70th-minute mark. Another short corner routine between Mo Ahmed and Ben Stevens allowed Stevens to whip a cross in. The ball floated past everyone in the area towards Luke Knight, who in turn passed it back to Burgess, who produced a delightful delivery from the opposite flank towards Swain, who nodded it in at the back post for his first goal in Real Bedford colours.

Moments later, Crawley Green picked up a consolation. A loose pass at the back from McGregor found Fullwood, who in turn played in Harry Peterson, who slotted it home to bring the game back to a twogoal deficit.

The 3-goal cushion was soon restored. Charlie Smith, Ben Stevens and Tom Hitchcock all linking up in the midfield left space in behind for Stevens to run into. Hitchcock tapped the ball towards Stevens, who steadied himself before smashing it past the keeper into the bottom left corner to complete his brace.

Crawley Green thought they had their second with a few minutes to go; a longrange Paris Smith header was palmed away acrobatically by McGregor, who collected it on the second time asking.

With the clock in the red, Real Bedford nearly put away a final chance. Claston Gordon, running down the right flank, played in Andy Sinclair, who Crawley Green defenders smothered before the referee blew his whistle for full-time.

THE AWAY TEA

Arlesey Town Football Club, rooted in Bedfordshire, England, and affiliated with the Bedfordshire County Football Association, currently competes in the Spartan South Midlands League Premier Division. They play their home games at New Lamb Meadow, continuing a legacy that began when the club was founded in 1891.

The club's journey in competitive football started in the Biggleswade & District League and progressed to the Bedfordshire County League in 1922. They quickly established themselves as a competitive side, finishing as runners-up in the first season and again in the subsidiary competition in 1923-24. However, after some early struggles which saw them leave and rejoin the league, Arlesey found success by winning the South Midlands League Division Two in the 1929-30 season.

Arlesey's football journey saw them experience fluctuating fortunes through the mid-20th century. They won multiple titles, including back-to-back league titles in the early 1950s, and transitioned through several leagues including the Parthenon League and the London League. A return to the South Midlands League in the 1960s was marked by immediate promotion and relegation, highlighting the club's resilient spirit.

The 1980s and early 1990s were marked by significant achieve-



ments and challenges. Arlesey won the Premier Division of the United Counties League in 1984-85 but faced financial hurdles leading to their return to the South Midlands League. The 1994-95 season was particularly triumphant as the club clinched the Premier Division title with a record points haul and secured the FA Vase at Wembley.

Entering the new millennium, Arlesey achieved consecutive promotions, moving from the Spartan South Midlands League Premier Division up to the Isthmian League with a record-breaking offensive season. They saw further reassignments across divisions due to league reorganizations, ultimately clinching the Division One Central title in the 2010–11 season and earning a spot in the Premier Division.

In recent years, Arlesey Town FC made headlines by reaching the first round of the FA Cup in consecutive seasons (2011-12 and 2012–13), facing teams like Salisbury City and Coventry City. However, following a releagtion from the Premier Division after the 2014–15 season, they suffered another drop to the Spartan South Midlands League Premier Division by the end of the 2017-18 season. Despite these setbacks, the club continues its passionate pursuit of football excellence.

On a wet Sunday afternoon at McMullen Park, Real Bedford Ladies looked to continue their perfect start to the season, hosting Needham Market in the league.

From the first whistle, the Pirates dominated proceedings, with Erin Price, Zara Carroll, and Gemma Croucher controlling the midfield and stifling any attempts from Needham to establish a foothold in the game.

The first real opportunity of the match came within the opening 10 minutes, courtesy of CJ's pace down the left flank. She put in a dangerous low cross, but Cesca Partridge was just out of reach. Amber Smith raced onto the loose ball, only to send her shot agonisingly wide of the target. Smith continued to threaten the Needham defence, nearly setting up Tasha Fensome in a move similar to the opening goal of last week's win against Stevenage, but this time, the ball was just too high for the head of the Bedford striker.

Bedford's persistence paid off in the 18th minute when Erin Price delivered a perfect through ball to Cesca Partridge. Partridge took a deft touch to evade the Needham defenders and unleashed a powerful strike from the edge of the box, finding the bottom left corner of the net.

The Pirates doubled their advantage just three minutes later. Gemma Croucher, deep in her own half, launched a pinpoint through ball to Tasha Fensome, who outpaced the Needham defence and coolly slotted the ball home, marking her



15th goal of the season.

Fensome netted her second of the day in the 27th minute following a long free kick from the Bedford captain, Zara Carroll, into the Needham Box. Her slight header confused the away side's defence, and the ball rolled into the net.

Needham's Page Wakefield narrowly missed a chance to get her side back in the game just before halftime. A low cross from the right found her free in the box, but as she slid in, she could only guide the ball wide of the sticks.

Second Half

The second half saw a shift in momentum, with the Pirates unable to capitalise on their chances and Needham gradually growing into the game. Fensome, Smith, and Partridge missed opportunities to extend the lead with good opportunities.

Needham's persistence finally paid off in injury time, capitalising on a rare mistake from the Pirates' defence to snatch a late consolation goal, courtesy of Lucy Loomes.

Despite a less convincing second half, Real Bedford Ladies walked away with all three points, maintaining their 100% start to the season and extending their lead at the top of the table to 8 points.
